Prayer has been answered fox the boy Bcual.om: quiotness came back within a few hours, and he kiosed his father's hands and head, asking forgiveness. There are battles with restlessness stili. but that is an.

Others of the Talobs seem drirting oway and coming trregularly, their places bejing taken by one or two new ones. The men's side of the reed screen, that divides the room on Sunday mornings, has been reinforced by more blind men, for lir Smeetion? little band of them is beginning to oxpand from the two "secc leevos" of last Spring, and he is often busy in cur crypt. at Rue du Croissent, with four or five mastering the mystories of Braill.c, and copying out pages of Gaspels or hymns. She meant that she would include her in the long litany of "bless" everybody with whom her short life had como in contact. Its last refrain is always "Bless everybody, and al.l. the peoples is very good, for Jesus: sake, Amen."

But the words have carried a meaning that goes ch echoing. Do we believo that our intercessions do realiy "bitess"? Are we acting as if we believed it?

And as the year slips out, all seems fooussed on wre need of that prevailing for our "little ships", that are left stronded by the tide that has ebbed away. - If prayer can bring it washing around them anew, the respnnsibility lies more with us than with them.
