- Recent developments in cognitive science may be of interest to VMers. I recently read a book by Benjamin Bergen (Bergen, Benjamin K., 2012. Louder then Words: the new science of how the mind makes meaning. New York: Basic Books). Bergen points us to embodied language, and shows us ways in which cognitive studies can enlighten our understanding of human beings and human thinking. Bergen demonstrates, using contemporary precise computerised research technology, that thinking is embodied. That is; human thought and as a result language is so integrally linked with the functioning of the human body and the context of life that it may be impossible to think outside of one's physical context. This to me has implications about bodily resurrection. More specifically for VMers; if thought itself is so strongly contextual, then clearly people will interpret theology contextually, suggesting that a prerequisite to the effective communication of knowledge of God is a sharing of context, something that VM seeks to enable.
