teen fairs in Algarve and lower Alentejo, and thirty-seven towns and villages, of which nineteen were visited for the first time. During the first two years bicycles were used, but in 1933 a Ford car was acquired. This has rendered excellent service. On an average it covers twenty-five miles a day, and by this means fifty-five villages, which had never previously been visited, have now been reached. During 1935, 4,402 copies of the Scriptures were distributed, of which 89 were Bibles and 2,328 Testaments. There is now need to extend the work to Lagos, Loule, Silves, Portimão and Tavira, but for this evangelists are needed.

Figures seem to demonstrate that, if the methods adopted by the Action Biblique had been employed everywhere, the results obtained in the evangelization of Portugal would have been four or five times greater, which once more brings us face to face with God's mighty dynamic for salvation, His Gospel.

Life and Death Struggle in Spain

The report of the group of Anglican and Free Churchmen who recently visited the Government areas of Spain contains much that is interesting to Evangelicals. The deputation did not find any evidence of organized anti-God propaganda, although anti-clericalism was rampant. Churches were closed and some of the clergy were in detention in order to protect them from the violence of the mob. But members of the party found copies of the Scriptures freely offered for sale on street bookstalls. On the whole Protestant church buildings have suffered little.

Several non-combatant evangelical workers have either died in prison or been executed in insurgent territory. There is some doubt about certain cases, owing to the absence of communications, but other cases are well established, and the circumstances have been distressing. The World's Evangelical Alliance (19, Russell Square, W.C.1) has opened a fund for the relief of evangelical workers and any contributions may be sent to the Treasurer.
